True Homes

Walking the Path, the Power of a Values Based Culture



Today we had the pleasure of hearing from our guest Mr. Mark Boyce, co-founder of the Charlotte based home building business True Homes. True Homes operates in Charlotte and has expanded to Raleigh, Wilmington, Winston Salem and Charleston. He is also the founder of Byron Fellowship, an Indiana based not for profit with the purpose of teaching young emerging leaders in engaging their unique abilities to cultivate generative efforts within their own communities in 5 day workshops. He is a

graduate of Palomar College in California and received his Masters from the University of Cambridge.

Mark recognized "The Table' when he walked in and disclosed publicly that his Linked In page has his "executive bourbon steward certification from Moonshine University." He can sit at "The Table" anytime!

He shared with us a retrospective of his first 10 years as CEO of True Homes. The screen showed a straight, pretty, wide road under blue skies and this has not been the journey of True Homes. He shared a picture of a winding, curvy, mysterious, daunting, foggy, lack of visibility and plenty of foot paths road that was reality for the first 10 years. Mark quoted the movie Matrix "you are going to realize that there is a difference between knowing the path and walking the path." Mark shared the Charlotte Mecklenburg single family building permits history from 2004 to 2006 (up to 20,298/year) and then from 2007 to 2011, permits bottomed out at 4,800/year and home prices declined over 20%. Mark moved his family from Indiana in the summer of 2007 to begin the business in August 2007(talk about timing)... Mark quoted Mark Vitner as saying "the worst housing market since the Civil War!" The first 5 years the company lived in existential crisis every day. By 2009, they had become the largest homebuilder in Charlotte and remained that until 2014 when he chose to cap his volume at 1,000 and national builders moved ahead of him. Today, the Charlotte home permits are at just 60% per year of where we were in 2007.

He then told his True Homes story in 4 chapters. He began with their short lived vision in 2007, survival of the business from 2008-2011, scaling was significant growth from the recovery from the recession 2012-2015 and then he has moved to the sustainability chapter (cap his home starts annually at 1500). Mark went on to share his companies vision, client philosophy, and updated mission statement (to be uniquely exceptional in how we relate to our clients, associates and trades).

He also shared statistics around affordable housing in Charlotte. From a Harvard housing

affordability study (function of jobs, population and pay), the target affordable multiple is 3.0 of affordability and a lower number is better. Charlotte was at 2.9 in 1995 and ballooned to 3.9 in 2016. This compares poorly to Raleigh (was 3.3 and now 3.5) yet San Francisco is an 8. Mark is passionate about our lack of meaningful conversations/plans to address this growing problem. He went to the Foundation for the Carolinas and they put him in touch with Community Link and Charlotte Bridge Home. Through that initiative, Mark and True Homes donate 2 homes per year to Community Link who finds deserving veterans to get these homes. He hopes his efforts will create more collaboration/interest from his industry and beyond in Charlotte.

Thanks Mark for giving us a nice program on the housing scene in Charlotte and thanks for your philanthropic efforts to help with the affordable housing problem.

Mark took a few questions from the club that included:

- True Homes average price points? The range is small townhouse \$120,000 to custom of \$800,000 but average is 2400 SF and priced at \$230,000.
- What is the current land/development cost per True Home? It was 25% prerecession and since he has bought much land from banks problem loans that is now 16% and will rise to a typical 20% in the coming couple years.
- Why sustainability/no growth now? He wants to create a culture of contentment.
- Does True build in many subdivisions or exclusive True Communities? Their own subdivisions.

Carol Jordan provided a report of projects funded through the club's World Community Service Committee and thanked committee members Benton Bragg, Jerry Coughter, Roger Sarow, Greg Sizemore and Sandy Osborne.

- \$2000 to Ebenezer Center School on the Island of Vanuatu in the South Pacific. Peace Corps Volunteers purchased materials to install a water tank to catch rain water that provided clean water for drinking & sanitation, a hand washing station, and two toilets.
