HOW I GOT WHERE I'M AT Greg Sizemore, Em Syrewicze, Travis Vance



Chris Kemper introduced our three speakers today, who shared with us tidbits of their life stories as well as their connection to Rotary. He also educated us a little about the origins of this program, one of our most popular Rotary traditions. As recounted by Powell Majors in his Recollections on our website. John Pender (1945-46 President) is credited with originating the with one program, albeit

difference. Back then, he would call on a random member of the club—new, old, young or more mature-- to speak extemporaneously about himself (there were only men back then!) and what brought him to Rotary. We all breathed a sigh of relief that the tradition was modified to include prior notice!

First up today was Greg Sizemore, an avid biker, judging by his bikebuying habits. Greg served in the U. S. Army from 1986-1990 and during that time, came to understand the true meaning of service above self. For two years during that time, he was stationed in Germany, which happened to be during the demise of the Berlin Wall. That experience taught him about the importance of communication (he was not conversant in the German language at that time) and working with others to achieve a common goal. When he left the Army, he returned to the States, earned a degree in International business from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte and an MBA from Wake Forest University. He is the Director of the North Carolina U. S. Export Assistance Center. Greg has two children and is involved in the community as a Boy Scout volunteer for his son's troop and his active involvement with Rotary.

Emilee (Em) Syrewicze has had an interest in Rotary since her stint at a Rotary Life Leadership Conference in Michigan at the age of 15. She was so impressed by the organization and its mission that she decided then that she wanted to be a Rotarian when she was an adult. Em was born in Luther, Michigan, a small town near Traverse City. She graduated Alma College (a tradition dating back to many generations in her family) and Vermont Law School. She was interested in environmental law and Vermont Law School was the leading educator in that field. She returned home to Michigan after graduation and took a position with the Northwest Michigan Supportive Housing agency in Traverse City. She learned very quickly that the organization was on its last legs financially and successfully worked to return it to financial viability. During that

time, she achieved her goal of Rotary membership and was active in the Traverse City Rotary. As an interesting aside, she shared with us a unique fact about that Rotary Club: it has an endowment of about \$50M and is a tremendous source of financial support for the areas it serves. Em was recruited to Charlotte to serve as the Executive Director of the Catawba Riverkeeper Foundation and, shortly after her move to Charlotte, began searching for an opportunity to become involved again in Charlotte. She met Catherine Browning and, as they say, the rest was history!

Had we not known better, we would have thought Travis was a comedian, rather than an attorney as he began to share his story. Not only does he have a good repertoire of lawyer jokes, he also told a few Clemson, Alabama, and Bristol, Tennessee native stories. Travis has a deep history with Rotary, having served as President at his former club and currently serving as District Membership Chair. He is an attorney, practicing employment law at Fisher & Phillips. A graduate of Sewanee and USC School of Law, Travis is an avid Alabama fan. His involvement with Rotary is driven by his belief that the work of Rotarians everywhere absolutely makes a difference in people's lives. He told the story of a young boy, growing up in poverty, who when given a pair of new shoes by the local civic club, saw the truth in the fact that making a difference is done one person, one community at a time. His story is living proof of that and service to Rotary, for him, is his way of living that truth.

Another great program and confirmation that our membership is rich with interesting stories!
