Ely Portillo, Assistant Director, UNC Charlotte Urban Institute



Kim Brattain introduced fellow journalist, Ely Portillo, with the comment that she has admired him and his writing from afar for a long time. Ely is currently Assistant Director of the UNC Charlotte Urban Institute, after having been with the Charlotte Observer for about 10 years, writing about and following the growth and development of our beloved Queen

City. He described the Institute as "think tank" of sorts, following and documenting the economic, social and environmental challenges facing a growing Charlotte and surrounding communities. In a short but interesting walk down memory lane, Ely shared some commentary from old periodicals and publications that described Charlotte with the tag line "a good place to live and do business." He discussed how Charlotte has grown both geographically and demographically, with our population increasing significantly through annexation of surrounding communities and an influx of businesses that attracted workers. And, the growth and people keep on coming.

Ely detailed three trends to watch as we consider the potential for continued growth:

- 1. Urbanization of surrounding small towns and suburbs. Charlotte is still very much a suburban city, with 84% of the land dedicated to residential development. With over 60% of that zoned for single family housing, the density needed to house incoming residents is not sufficient.
- 2. Best laid plans. Plans are in place to add infrastructure for parks and recreation, transportation, multiple housing options, and other amenities that will attract a broader demographic, as population continues to grow. These plans are expected to not only attract businesses and workers to our community but also enhance quality of life for those of us who are already here.
- 3. Internationalization. Currently, one in six residents of Mecklenburg

County are born outside the U.S. Our immigrant population increased by almost 19% from 2012-2017, while the overall population increased by about 11%. Mexico and India, first and second, respectively, are the top countries represented in people migrating to Charlotte. This component of growth brings with it tremendous implications for jobs, politics and culture.

Forces at work that will impact our growth and success economically hinge on several factors: COVID-19 related impacts on transportation, office space, jobs overall but especially those that are hard hit, including hospitality, entertainment, and travel, and education. The long-term implications for all of these are unknown. It will take a lot of money to pay for the planned improvements—transportation, parks and recreation and affordable housing—the source of which will likely be a combination of higher taxes, increased bond referendums, to mention a few. The current challenge of finding affordable housing is exacerbated by the lack of housing inventory of any kind in the market at present. Prices are up and apartment supply is challenged. Given an expected influx of close to 400,000 people over the next 20 years, overcoming the housing challenge may be the biggest threat to our continued growth.

Charlotte remains a great place to live and work. Let's hope in the coming years, through thoughtful and innovative planning and implementation, we will continue to enjoy a great quality of life. I expect it will, given the time, energy and expertise expended by Ely and others, through the Institute and the broader community.
