This Week's Meeting



Michael Bitzer, Politics Dept Chair/Professor of Politics and History, Catawba College by Paul Bartholomy

Dr. Michael Bitzer was welcomed to the stage of Charlotte Rotary with a room full of open eyes and ears ready to become better informed on the political landscape of our nation as well as our home state of North Carolina. With his wealth of knowledge and notable expertise accumulated from years of research and teaching, we were privileged to learn the unique political facts and insights that he had to share.

Dr. Bitzer explained how North Carolina is a battleground state and furthermore a "stuck and bipolar" state. It was noted that the key factor driving a lot of North Carolina politics these days is regionalism. "If


you drive from any point in the state 45 minutes in any direction, you will feel as if you are in a very different state". He explained that this regionalism has a huge component in helping us understand our state's politics. Party identification is so evenly divided in our state, but when you split our state into the four varying regions of central cities, urban suburbs, surrounding suburban counties, and rural counties, you can see how party identification differs in these areas. The resulting combination though is a highly polarized and competitive state. He does not see this changing any time soon for North Carolina. Click here to read more.

Western North Carolina Relief


