Global Thinkers Panels - International Relations and Implications for Rotarians by Bill Bartee

Mike Hawley, Past President of Charlotte Rotary and retired Partner of K&L Gates Law Firm, invited the panel of "Global Thinkers" onto the stage of Charlotte Rotary with the statement that there was not enough time to cover the entirety of topics. The talent and wisdom of the panel was on full display from the beginning, which included the moderator.

That moderator, Hawley, gave a brief biography of each participant, an expectation of the presentation, and the summary that would conclude the program. He then shared his thoughts that Rotary was able to play a pivotal role on the planet in the future. Using the metaphor that one of the most valuable currencies that the world has is not money but the "dots that we collect and connect in our journey along the way." This social capital is something that should be curated and exercised whenever possible. He encouraged the club membership to battle against the "Triple T, the Tendency of Tables to be Tribal". Charlotte Rotary has 100 members who meet each week, and they should interact, share, and get to know each other to strengthen the social capital and talent at hand. He also theorized about the Rotary 4-Way Test and its lack of flow. It is purposefully done so. The Rotary Four-Way Test is one of Rotary's most enduring and widely quoted guiding principles. Here's a brief history of its origins and significance:

#### History of the Rotary Four-Way Test

The Four-Way Test was created in 1932 by Herbert J. Taylor, a Chicago Rotarian who had been asked to help rescue a struggling aluminum company, Club Aluminum Products. Facing a crisis of trust and financial instability during the Great Depression, Taylor believed that strong ethical principles could help turn the company around. He drafted 24 words that became the Four-Way Test—a code of ethics for personal and business relationships.

The test is simple, but powerful:

Of the things we think, say or do:

- 1. Is it the TRUTH?
- 2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?

Taylor implemented the test throughout the company, and it played a key role in restoring both

profitability and integrity.

In 1943, Rotary International adopted the Four-Way Test, and it quickly became a cornerstone of the organization's commitment to high ethical standards in both personal and professional life. Today, it's recited by Rotarians around the world and used as a model for decision-making and character-building.

#### The Roots of Rotary's Fight to End Polio

Rotary's polio eradication journey began on September 29, 1979, when volunteers in the Philippines administered oral polio vaccine to children—marking the first Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grant project. Then-RI President James L. Bomar Jr. symbolically launched the campaign by giving the first dose, sparking a joint effort with the Philippine government to immunize 6 million children. The project's success led to Rotary making polio eradication a global priority, launching PolioPlus in 1985 and co-founding the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988. Since then, over 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated worldwide. Click here to read more.

Historical Significance – Casablanca has been a major port city with a deep trade history, while Statesville played a vital role in North Carolina's railroad and tobacco industries.


*Transportation Hubs* – Casablanca is Morocco's largest port and a major transportation center, while Statesville was historically a key trade hub in North Carolina.
